


The book was found

An elaborately locked wooden box requiring four separate but missing keys

holds the treasure in this modern-day quest. Jeremy's father lived his life preparing for an early death, as foretold by a fortune-teller. He did, in fact, die when Jeremy was eight, but a package from him containing the locked box arrives one month before Jeremy's 13th birthday, the day on which the box is to be opened. With his friend Lizzy, Jeremy searches for the keys while contemplating the words engraved on the box, *The Meaning of Life: For Jeremy Fink. 13th Birthday*. The search for the keys takes the friends around and about New York City, where they meet a large and increasingly convenient range of supporting characters, from members of a spiritualist congregation to a prominent astronomer, all of whom point them toward their own takes on the meaning of life. Mystery and adventure fans will be pulled in by the locked box, and, as a bonus, will get to know quirky, scientific Jeremy and impulsive Lizzy. The summer he turns 13, Jeremy receives a mysterious box with the engraved words "the meaning of life: for Jeremy Fink on his thirteenth birthday." The box was left by his father, who has been dead for five years. It has four locks, but Jeremy finds no keys to open them. As Jeremy and his best friend, Lizzy, embark on a quest to find the keys, they travel across Manhattan from flea markets to fancy office buildings and museums, searching, as it turns out, not only for keys but also insights into science, religion, art, friendship, and family. The overlong plot lurches from one contrivance to another, and the end is a total setup, but readers will be hooked by the kids' fast, funny urban adventure, as well as by the quest and the "existential crisis." Unlike any other book I have ever read, this one is quite the drama! It has everything a good book needs: Comedy, Drama, Mystery, Pain and a bit of an unknown type of genre. We chose this as our "one book, one school" in our middle school. All staff and students were to read it over the summer. It was very age appropriate. The majority of kids told me they liked it.

My son and I got more than we bargained for with his story that delves into the search for meaning in life through science, religion, humanism, etc. I thought the book got off to a slow start and my son thought it "rambled". However, over all, we were impressed that the book took on these lofty topics in a fun and entertaining way.

Normally, I would never read a fiction by choice, I had to read for summer homework. But this has to be one of the best books I've ever read! Full of mystery and anticipation that keeps you on your toes. Also, this book will make you think deeply about your life and how you live it. I think me and Jeremy would've gotten along well.

I read this book aloud to 6th graders. I loved it and they were into it too (there is one chapter that gets a bit long for everyone). It was such a good story I cried as I read the end (yes in front of a room full of kids :) I bought the book on tape to play to another group of kids. It doesn't hold their attention like the read aloud did
